

Summary of Request for 2014-2016

The Orientation Steering Committee (OSC) is requesting our budget to be raised to \$9.30 per student for the 2014-2016 funding cycle. All in all, we are dedicated to using the student activity fee in the best way possible to maximize the well-being of all students. There are three requests that contribute to our need for an increase in funding for this upcoming byline funding cycle. Specifically, these include late night programming, transfer student engagement, and student safety, specifically sexual assault education and prevention.

Firstly, the OSC has increased the number and scale of late night programming events throughout orientation and plans to allocate \$0.10 of the requested increase in funding in order to expand future efforts. Most notably, the event that takes place on the first Friday night all new students arrive in August Orientation ("First Night") has seen record attendance numbers in recent years. In August 2012, a finalist from the TV show "America's Got Talent" attracted thousands of students to stick around until late into the night. As a result, many more freshmen than years' past remained on North Campus in a safe, non-drinking environment. Likewise, the performing duo "Black Violins" continued this success of preventing new students from wandering down to Collegetown upon arrival of their first night at Cornell in August 2013. In the current cycle, we have increased the number of late night programs by 20%. In addition, the average end time of late night programming during Orientation is now after 2:00 am. In our previous funding cycle, the average was 1:00 am. We have worked closely with CUPD and IPD and have seen declines in the number of new students ticketed or transported from Collegetown during Orientation. In the next funding cycle, the OSC hopes to continue to grow the number, size, and duration of late night events in order to provide as many new students as possible a safe environment for meeting classmates. While we have had success putting on these events in the past, the increased cost of drawing notable talent has decreased funding for other valuable events and in particular, we would like to focus on having events on Friday and Saturday run later in the evening than they currently do.

Furthermore, \$0.10 of the request for increased funding will be allocated towards enhancing transfer student engagement. The OSC has made a point to bettering the transfer experience as best as possible by putting on a multitude of events throughout both January and August. For instance, in August 2013, there were twenty-one unique programs offered for transfer students during Transfer Student Orientation. These efforts have been hugely successful at providing transfers with an environment that is highly conducive to meeting other transfer students. However, we know that transfer students report wanting to be able to meet more current students during Orientation. This increase in funding will allow us to open more programs to current students as additional funds can support additional

attendance at programs. Currently our budget for transfer student programming is maxed out because we have such a large proportion of new transfer students attending Transfer Orientation events.

Lastly, the OSC has made great strides in the current cycle with regards to partnering with Student Assembly's effort to enhance student safety. Every year, the OSC has continued to provide volunteers with a list of resources to make available to their new students. For example, in all training sessions for volunteers we have made a point to emphasis the use of the ResCUer phone application in order to further student safety as well as provide volunteers with important safety information that they have to share with all of their new students. Additionally, the OSC has introduced new mandatory programming for all new students around sexual assault prevention. All new students are now required to attend a show entitled "Speak About It." This new initiative is a performance-based presentation about consent, boundaries and healthy relationships that combines humorous yet provocative skits, interactive dialogue, and powerful monologues. It specifically addresses issues including consent, sexual assault, and bystander intervention. This program has witnessed tremendous success, as evident in survey results seen in Appendix A. OSC teamed up with various student organizations to get input on the show, provide information about their organizations, and to serve as a resource for students during the event. While the OSC received a one time, \$15,000 grant from the President's Council of Cornell Women (PCCW) to fund the show in August 2013, permanent funding is needed so that we can provide all new undergraduate students comprehensive sexual assault prevention education at the beginning of their Cornell careers. In order for this programming to continue, we will need to apportion \$1.50 of the increased budget towards a sexual assault program. As has been acknowledged recently by many students and administrators of the Cornell community, sexual assault prevention is an issue that must not go unaddressed. "Speak About It" or a program with similar candor and content is one of many steps that Cornell must take towards addressing this crucial issue.

The OSC is committed to designing an orientation that ensures a smooth, fun, and safe transition to all new students at Cornell. We believe our programming is successful in many of these areas, but there is always room for improvements as noted in our budget requests. All in all, it is our goal that orientation will serve as a model program in all of the areas important to Cornell and new students, and these requests serve a vital role in bettering the Cornell community as a whole.

Mission Statement

The mission of the Orientation Steering Committee is to foster a safe environment in which volunteers successfully plan and execute an enjoyable and extraordinary Orientation that builds student leadership, promotes teamwork, gives back to Cornell, and welcomes new students and families to the Cornell Community by encouraging student to cultivate new relationships and increase their independence while exploring their new home.


The organization's sole purpose is to create a structured and enjoyable environment where new students can attend exciting and informative events. These events introduce new students to other members of their class, professors, peer mentors, and members of student body. Having an entire week devoted to this purpose allows students to become familiar with campus and find answers to pertinent questions before classes start. Central to this mission is the role of the Orientation Leader (OL) who serves as a mentor for a small group of new students in their college. Students that transfer to Cornell are placed with an Orientation Leader from their college who also transferred to Cornell. The role of the OL is to serve as a mentor to new students and help students navigate their first few weeks on campus.

The entire campus is impacted by orientation because every new student in each class has gone through Orientation Week as the Orientation Steering Committee runs Orientation in January for spring transfers (175) and in the fall for fall transfers (550) and first-year students (approximately 3250). Every year we have more than 1,000 current students apply to volunteer for Orientation. We work with a large number of student organizations (see Appendix B) across campus, benefiting new students who learn about opportunities across campus, and also student organizations who not only have the opportunity to recruit new members, but to share important information to the newest members of our community. Finally, the Orientation Steering Committee works very closely with the Office of New Student Programs on campus to make sure that all new students are receiving a comprehensive introduction to all aspects of the Cornell community. This why our events are not only social events that help new students meet each other. While opportunities for community building are found throughout Orientation, we are also committed to providing students with an introduction to academic and intellectual life on campus, exposing students to Cornell's history and traditions, inviting students to take advantage of the incredible diversity on our campus, outlining expectations of being a member of Cornell's community, and familiarizing students with the plethora of resources available on campus. To this end, required programming like Cornell Essentials (including Real Students, Reel Stories and Cheating), The New Student Reading Project, "Speak About It", and Tapestries, all play a crucial role in Orientation.

Organization Profile

The Orientation Steering Committee (OSC) is a 14-member committee which works under the auspices of the Office of New Student Programs in the Office of the Provost and the Office of the Dean of Students. The student-run committee is responsible for the planning and implementation of all university-wide orientation activities for new undergraduate students entering in both August and January as well as recruiting, selecting and training over 600 student volunteers. Orientation activities in August normally last five days, beginning on move-in day and ending the night before classes start. Activities in January last for six days immediately before classes begin. The purpose of these activities is to acquaint new undergraduate students— both transfers and first-years—with Cornell, its resources, history & values, and to promote interaction and unity among the new additions to this community. The four goals of Orientation are: building academic and personal self-confidence; building the community (cultural, residential, social, and recreational); developing intellectual skills and passions; and participating in community life.

Student Participation

Volunteers: Over 600 students volunteer in the Orientation Program each year (approximately 630 in August, 30 in January) and serve as ambassadors for the rest of the Cornell Community. There are 4 different levels of volunteers: Orientation Steering Committee (OSC), Orientation Supervisors (OSs), Orientation Leaders (OLs) for both August and January, and members of the Move-In Crew (MICs).

Orientation Steering Committee: The committee (14 people each year) is responsible for recruiting, selecting, and training OSs, OLs, and MICs and for making programmatic decisions and coordinating events. The outgoing committee, through an application and interview process, chooses the new OSC from interested past Orientation volunteers in late September. The chair or co-chairs, who usually have served on the previous committee, guide the OSC; if there are no returning members, the chair or co-chairs are selected by the outgoing chairs and advisor among the incoming new members. The chair or co-chairs work closely with our advisor, Sarah H. Jones, the Assistant Dean of Students for New Student Programs, and other University officials to coordinate each step of the Orientation program & experience. Each member is individually responsible for specific events and duties (such as publicity, recruitment, or transfer transitions), while the entire group works together to coordinate additional efforts with college and university officials and members of the Ithaca community.

Orientation Supervisors (OSs): (between 60-75 each year) work closely with the OSC and are selected in early spring. They are integral to the recruitment, selection, and training

process for all Orientation Leaders. These dedicated individuals attend a brief training session in the spring and two days of intense training in the fall. The OSs then assist in leading the training for the Orientation Leaders for an additional two days. Each OS is assigned a group of OLs that they are responsible to train and supervise throughout the orientation period to ensure that they are providing their new students with the assistance they are seeking as well as to answer any questions or concerns the OLs may have regarding their role or responsibilities. They assist in the coordination of Move-In Day (and work all day) and are responsible for the supervision of the Orientation Leaders and Move-In Crew assigned to each building in addition to traffic. They also spend as much as ten hours meeting with their own small group of new students to share vital Cornell information, talk about decision-making, and assisting the new students with making friends and feeling connected to our community.

Orientation Leaders and January Orientation Leaders (OLs and JOLs): participate in a two-day training session in the fall or January during which they receive multicultural and leadership training, develop listening and advising skills, and learn about resources of the University and how to help new students and parents cope with the changes they are facing upon entering Cornell. OLs assist new students with their belongings on Move-In day (each person works a four-hour shift), and work closely with the Cornell University Police and the Office of Transportation Services to ensure a smooth traffic flow and move-in process on north & west campuses in addition to Collegetown. They spend an average of 10 hours with their new students throughout orientation, volunteer to assist with events, and are available throughout the year to answer questions and address concerns that new students may continue to have. There are approximately 20-30 January Orientation Leaders each year and 400-500 Orientation Leaders.

Move-In Crew: The position of Welcome Volunteer was introduced in 1997 to give students who want to help with the Orientation program but who are not available throughout the orientation period an opportunity to participate. The Move-In Crew was introduced in the spring of 2007 to broaden the participation. In addition to extra volunteers through the MIC, students can participate through the Greek Councils (also known as the "Greek Movers & Shakers"), as an athlete, or through ROTC. These volunteers all work a four-hour shift on Move-In day and are most often assigned to high-traffic buildings to help new students move in. There are over 400 volunteers on the Move-In Crew each year.

New Students: This past August exactly 3,801 new students participated in the five-daylong Orientation program in August. This number includes both First-Year students (freshmen) and transfers. There are over 150 events offered during August Orientation about half of which the OSC are intricately involved in. Due to the closure of the Transfer Center and the changes made to in transfer housing and transfer programming, the OSC has begun play a larger role in the orientation experience of Transfer students. This past August, we continued our efforts to expand and improve a separate Orientation for transfer students to address their unique needs and desires. Transfer Orientation continues to be extremely successful and now offers more than 20 events specifically for transfer students. The January Orientation program welcomes about 150-175 new transfer students each

January, and the OSC is responsible for all aspects of the Transfer Orientation program offered in January and works closely with the colleges on college-run events.

<u>History</u>

Orientation started after the onset of WWI. As Cornell switched into a more practical style of learning, focusing on fitness, military tactics, and machinery and weaponry sciences, it became apparent that there was a need to develop a program to introduce students to the campus and advise them on staying healthy and dealing with the rigorous academics of the university. This was the first time "orienting" students was ever discussed. In 1929, Professor Richard Uhrbrock advised the university to follow the University of Maine and institute a Freshman Week and have freshman come a week before classes started.

The Freshmen Week Committee was created and upperclassmen were selected to welcome new students to campus. This was the beginning of OSs and OLs as we know them today. As Orientation grew, the committee had to deal with issues such as creating an orientation that's sole purpose was to guide new students and introduce them to campus rather than provide a baby-sitting service for freshmen for a week.

Today the Orientation Steering Committee works with the Assistant Dean of Students in the office of New Student Programming. We work to provide a safe, fun, and exciting introduction to campus as well as inherently offering ways to develop leadership skills to current upperclassmen.

Activities, Programming & Events in the Current Funding Cycle

There have been no major changes to Orientation either financially or operationally in the current funding cycle. There have however, been many improvements to the Orientation program in this cycle. A few highlights include:

- 1. Late Night Programming: Late night programs have grown by 20% in the current funding cycle. In addition, the average end time of late night programming during Orientation is now after 2:00am. In our previous funding cycle, the average was 1:00am. We have worked closely with CUPD and IPD and have seen declines in the number of new students ticketed or transported from Collegetown during Orientation.
- 2. *Transfer Student Programming:* A comprehensive Transfer Student Orientation is now offered during August Orientation. Rather than transfer students having to attend events designed for first-year students, in August 2013 twenty-one unique transfer student only events were offered.
- 3. *Increased Selectivity for Orientation Volunteers:* The selection process, specifically for Orientation Leaders, has been increasing selective over the past 10 years. Increased selectivity allows us to have stronger, more dedicated volunteers to welcome new students to campus.

The goal of Orientation continues to be to offer quality programming that welcomes new students and their families to campus, allows new students to cultivate new relationships, increase their independence, and explore their new home. In assessment data from the 2012 August Orientation Survey¹ new students report the following:

1) Overall how would you evaluate your Orientation experience?

29.5% Excellent

53.0% Good

1.2% Poor

Transfer students: 30.5% Excellent 56.0% Good 0.6% Poor

Constitution, Charter, & Bylaws

I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Orientation Steering Committee, hereafter referred to as OSC.

II. PURPOSE

This group will plan and run Orientation programs in January and August to introduce and acclimate new undergraduate students, both first-years and transfers, to Cornell University including recruiting, selecting & training over 800 volunteers annually.

III. FUNCTIONS

The function of the OSC shall be to:

- Section 1: Plan and run programs for new undergraduate students entering Cornell University in January and August.
- Section 2: Select and train January Orientation Leaders.
- Section 3: Select and train August Orientation Supervisors, Orientation Leaders, and members of the Move-in Crew

IV. MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1: Membership on the OSC is limited to full-time registered students of Cornell University
- Section 2: Each member will be a full OSC member, eligible to cast one vote in all OSC matters.
- Section 3: Members are selected by application and interviewed by the previous year's committee in September.
- Section 4: All members must have served as Orientation Volunteers. The chair or co-
- Section 5: The Assistant Dean of Students for New Student Programs will serve as the Advisor to the OSC.

V. OFFICERS

- Section 1: The officers of the OSC will consist of a chair or co-chairs.
- Section 2: Chair or Co-chairs will be selected by the previous year's committee before the first meeting of the new committee.

Section 3: Chair or Co-chairs must be members of the OSC. Chair or Co-chairs of the outgoing OSC are ineligible to become chair or co-chairs of the incoming OSC.

VI. COMMITTEE SELECTION

Section 1: The OSC shall select new OSC members after the August Orientation program concludes.

Section 2. No incoming OSC member may be selected without having completed the application and interview process.

VII. MEETINGS

Section1: OSC will meet once a week throughout the academic year and for a prespecified period of time immediately prior to orientation volunteer training.

Section 2: Additional meetings may be called by the Chair, Co-Chairs, or Advisor.

VIII. COMMITTEES

Section 1: The Committee may establish sub-committees, as it deems necessary

IX. NON DISCRIMINATION

Section 1: The OSC shall not discriminate on the basis of actual or perceived age, color, disability, ethnicity, gender identity or expression, marital status, national origin, race, religion, sexual orientation, veteran status, or any combination of these factors when determining its membership and when determining the equal rights of all general members and executive board members, respectively, which shall include, but are not limited to, voting for, seeking, and holding positions within the organization.

X. AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the OSC by a two-thirds vote of the committee, provided that the amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting, and that all OSC members have been notified. The advisor will serve as tie-breaking vote when necessary.

XI. APPROVAL

This constitution shall be effective upon a two-thirds vote of the OSC. The advisor will serve as tie-breaking vote when necessary.
